Look at the following arrangements of circles.

1





What pattern can you see in the numbers 1, 4, 9, and 16?

Here, $1 = 1 \times 1$ $4 = 2 \times 2$ $9 = 3 \times 3$

$$4 = 2 \times 2$$

$$9 = 3 \times 3$$

$$16 = 4 \times 4$$

The numbers 1, 4, 9, 16, 25..... are formed by multiplying a number by itself. Such numbers are called square numbers.

So, 1 = 1 4 = 2 9 = 3 16 = 4 25 = 5

$$4 = 2$$

$$9 = 3$$

$$16 = 4$$

$$25 = 5 \dots$$

1, 4, 9, 16, 25, 36..... are <u>squares</u> of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6.....respectively. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 are the <u>square roots</u> of 1, 4, 9, 16, 25..... respectively.

We use symbol ' $\sqrt{}$ ' to denote the square root.

The square root of 225 is 15.

The symbol is called a radical.

i.e. $\sqrt{225} = \sqrt{5 \times 5 \times 3 \times 3} = 5 \times 3 = 15$
